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he number of unemployed people at the end of March was 265, which is 7.6% less than the previous month and 9.2% less than the same month of the previous year (402 people). Regarding the number of applicants for improvement in the month of March, it was 280 people, with a decrease of 6% compared to the previous month and 34.6% less than last year.


On the other hand, the total number of jobs offered is 1,630, with a positive monthly variation of 44.6%. Compared to the same month of the previous year, the variation in the number of jobs offered is positive, with 10.6%.

According to the data published by the Department of Statistics, during the last twelve months there has been an average of 398 applicants in research and 324 in improvement with a negative variation compared to the previous year of 40.2%. The majority of applicants registered with the Employment Service who are looking for work have been unemployed for less than six months. 57.9% of those whose employment situation is improving have a temporary contract. The vast majority of the unemployed (87.9%) are short-term, while 12.1% are long-term.

In terms of nationality and length of residence, the largest group are the Spanish (32.6%) with ten years or more of residence, followed by the Portuguese with 8.7%.

Applicants looking for a job are mainly concentrated in the 40 to 59 age group (45.2%) while applicants for an improvement in their employment situation are in the same age group, and represent 47.5%. The number of women looking for a job represents 47.1%, slightly lower than that of men (52.9%)

dents are Andorran with 38.2% and Spanish with 33.2%, followed by other nationalities (17.9%), Portuguese (7.1%) and finally the French with a 3.6%

On the other hand, according to data from the Department of Welfare on the last day of March, 21 people were beneficiaries of financial benefits due to involuntary unemployment. 61.9% are between the ages of 40 and 59, and the majority are women. Regarding the time of residence, 55.6% of the beneficiaries of the aid are ten or more years living in Andorra.

Finally, in terms of programs for the foundation of private sector recruitment, there were 27 workers contracted to public or parapublic administrations and 25 people contracted to the private sector. ≡

The advanced average salary is 2,365 euros

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The advanced average salary is 2,365 euros and the median 1,872 in February. The data published by the Department of Statistics also indicate that the number of employees is 45,631, which represents an increase in the number of workers of 6.7%, while the wage bill increases by 11.6%, which means 107,918.380 euros.

Regarding the data accumulated in the last year, the average number of employees increased by 9.8%, that is to say 41,938 people.

Registered businesses increased by 1.8%

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The first quarter of 2023 closes with a total of 11,790 active establishments registered in the commercial register, which represents an increase of 1.8%. According to the sector of economic activity, the repair of motor vehicles and motorcycles stands out (3,142 establishments); professional, scientific and technical activities (2,436 establishments), and hospitality (1,041 establishments). ≡

✓ El dia de la balena (the day of the whale), by Melcior Comes (Editorial Univers, 2023)

When we look back and tell each other our history, we often identify days, moments... that mark a milestone, a vital before and after. For Martí, the protagonist, the day a dead whale appears on the beach (with all the symbolic and poetic echoes that come to mind) marks the end of a happy and carefree childhood. The novel transports us to the Mallorca of the 90s and is a song about friendship, those authentic friendships of adolescence, with a soundtrack by the Pixies.

✓ *El que mai et vaig dir* (What I never told you), by Noemí Rodríguez (Editorial Límits, 2023)

The journalist begins her literary adventure with this collection of thoughts where she reflects on various experiences through different literary genres.

It is a love story set on an island in Japan in the 1950s. Although it may seem contradictory, it is a short novel, which tells the story of a love between people of different social classes at the time of transit from adolescence to adulthood. A classic theme that I personally love.

Last January, the philosopher and expert in religions presented Entre els deus i el no-res (Fragmenta, 2023), an essay (easy to read) that aims to be a map to orient us in the face of the complexity of questions relating to faith. Undoubtedly, an

✓ Pensaments i opuscles (Thoughts and pamphlets(, by Blaise Pascal (Editorial Adesiara, 2021) Translated and edited by Pere Lluís Font, this is, without any doubt, the best edition of this classic of thought. Pere Lluís Font has devoted practically his entire life to it, and has turned this very elegant and very careful Catalan translation into a world reference, even in France.

✓ Aquesta foscor en que confio (This darkness in which I trust), by Joan Casañas (Editorial Claret, 2023)

An engaging work where we are shown the trajectory of a man who filled the silence with completely coherent actions between his life and a confidence wrapped in silence. It is at the same time a tribute to a life dedicated to the poorest and to denouncing all collusion between power and religion.

✓ *Elogi de l'ombra* (Praise of the shadow), by Junichiro Tanizaki (Angle, 2006)

It is an essay by Junichiro Tanizaki from 1933 in which he reflects on some differences between the East and the West in terms of cultural elements and how these are blurred due to the modernization of Japan, which began in 1868. According to the author's theory, in the West, light predominates, and in Japan, darkness, a contrast that inevitably affects life.
